CompleteCare Breaks Ground in Bridgeton

On November 13th, CompleteCare Health Network hosted a groundbreaking ceremony to celebrate the start of a new project in Bridgeton that will house a Community Health Center, pharmacy, and the organization's administrative offices.

Expected to open in late 2020, the 30,000 square foot building will feature nine exam rooms and offer primary care, adult medicine, podiatry, chiropractic care, and infectious disease services. The Health Center will also have on-site phlebotomist for services.

The new headquarters will move from CompleteCare's current location on Cohansey Street to Pearl Street in Bridgeton. A majority of the land was vacant for many years before CompleteCare decided to take on this largescale project. The site is anticipated to see over 18,000 patient visits annually and will employ 90 staff members.

HRSA Boosts NJ Center Dental Programs

On September 18th, HRSA awarded close to \$1 million to three New Jersey FQHCs to expand their oral health service capacity through new infrastructure enhancements. The award recipients include Henry J. Austin Health Center (HJAHC), Ocean Health Initiatives, Inc. (OHI), and Paterson Community Health Center. Each Center will receive \$300,000 to expand dental infrastructure, which is part of a \$85 million total award to Health Centers nationwide.

The HRSA funding is the first of its kind to solely invest in oral health infrastructure. It will enable Health Centers to provide new and/ or improve existing oral health services. HJAHC will create two new dental exam rooms as well as hire a dentist and a part-time oral surgeon. Paterson Community Health Center plans to renovate their dental space and hire additional dentists. OHI will utilize the grant funding to purchase new screening equipment, upgrade its computer technology, and expand training so that more patients are tested for oral cancer.

The event featured a panel of speakers including Women's Health Initiative Board Chair, Lisett Lebron; JRMC Chief Compliance Officer and Breast Cancer Survivor, Jaime Rivello; Aetna Better Health of New Jersey Strategic Alliance Account Manager and event co-host, Quiche Jones; and JRMC CEO, John T. Guests in attendance comprised of surrounding business district leaders, city officials, organizational partners, JRMC staff, and local residents.

The new women's health initiative was announced during Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Breast cancer is the second most common type of cancer in women. The goal of the event was to promote awareness and education for breast cancer screenings, early detection, and support services. JRMC treats 16,000 female patients annually. More than 50% of these patients have never received a mammogram.

More than 48 dental professionals and 75 nonclinical volunteers donated their services for all or part of the weekend. In total, the two-day event accommodated 220 service appointments.





The Symposium's theme was to increase access to quality oral care in rural New Jersey as well as President and CEO, Eva Turbiner; NJDOH State and government employees.

On November 15th, the NJDOH Office of Dental Director, Dr. Darwin Hayes; and HRSA Primary Care and Rural Health; NJPCA; Zufall Senior Medical Officer/Physician Region II, Dr. Health Center; New Jersey Health Initiatives; Tanya Pagán Raggio-Ashley also provided Horizon Foundation for New Jersey; and the plenary sessions on their respective areas of expertise.

The Keynote Speaker, Alliance Dental Center Chief Dental Officer. During the visit, Zufall demonstrated their primary care service delivery model, and provided tours of their dental office and mobile health unit. On November 25th, North Hudson Community Action Corporation (NHCAC) opened the Dr. Herbert B. Holtzman Dental Center at its Englewood Health Center. The Dental Center was made possible with assistance from the Holtzman family, Englewood Hospital, and Englewood Mayor, Michael Wildes.

The late Dr. Holtzman had a dental practice affiliated with Englewood Hospital for many years before his retirement. His two daughters were saddened when the Hospital closed its dental clinic. As a result, they were determined to do something to continue their father's legacy. When the daughters approached NHCAC President and CEO, Joan Quigley, Ms. Quigley told them how expensive it was to launch a dental service. The women offered to raise at least \$100,000 to help start the new dental center.

The trustees of the North Hudson Foundation offered another \$50,000 and Englewood Hospital agreed to provide more space in the FQHC's lease. North Hudson also supported Englewood Hospital's application for a dental residency program, which will begin in July 2020.

After 18 months of planning, NHCAC and its partners celebrated the new dental center with a ribbon cutting ceremony.

The Need for Population Health Software

Over the last thirty years, many models of health care have been promoted, including Community Oriented Primary Care, Capitated Care, Patient Centered Medical Home. Accountable Care and now Value-Based Care. Although each are unique, each model shares a core goal that Health Centers must define a population

of patients under their care and ensure that these patients receive necessary treatment. The big change that HRSA promises is that population-based health will become an expectation. With this expectation comes financial risk and responsibility. FQHCs will need to keep patients engaged in care and not simply provide proficient care when patients are in the Health Center.

At Eric B. Chandler Health Center, we have implemented population health software to help put a virtual string around specific high-risk populations. A population may be high-risk immediately (patients recently hospitalized or in the emergency room), over a medium term (abnormal cervical cancer screening) or over the long-term (uncontrolled diabetes). Other populations requiring special attention include our HIV infected patients and a group of patients, who have serious and persistent mental illness, that we co-manage with a nearby behavioral healthcare facility.

Population health software enables us to apply a specific "tracking type" to a patient's record, which identifies the patient as a member of that cohort. Some tracking types are applied automatically based on rules (presence of a diagnosis on the problem list) and others manually.

The software allows an unlimited number of tracking types and patients can have more than one.

The benefit of population health software is that it makes it is much easier to care manage populations. After the tracking type has been applied, the process continues by specifying the essential elements of care for each population. For a patient with diabetes, an example would be tracking that they receive an annual eye exam and quarterly hemoglobin A1C test. Another example would be to specify the next step and follow up on an abnormal cervical cancer screening result.

Easy Tracking and Management

The software can retrieve this information directly from the electronic medical record or users can input the information manually. Through reports and reminders, patients and their health needs do not fall through the cracks. Population health software eliminates the need for data entry staff; constant reminders for providers to comply with complicated work arounds; and the use of spreadsheets that quickly become unmanageable when not properly maintained. It is hard to imagine surviving in a valued-based environment without it

CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICERS The Pros and Cons of Self-Insuring Your Health Center

Across New Jersey, FQHCs are watching the costs of doing business rise astronomically while reimbursement rates remain stagnant. As a result, CFOs are struggling to find ways to reduce cost. One option available to Health Centers is to consider a Self-Funded Health Plan.

The <u>Self-Insurance Institute of America, Inc.</u> defines a self-insured health plan as one in which "the employer assumes the financial risk for providing health care benefits to its employees." In practice, self-insured employers pay claims as they are incurred in lieu of paying a premium to an insurance carrier.

PROS OF SELF-INSURED PLANS:

- Potential cost savings and improved cash flow;
- Choice of claim administrator (Health Center, insurance carrier or third-party administrator);
- Allows purchase of stop-loss insurance preventing Health Centers from assuming all the financial risk;
- Control over benefit design and freedom from certain State mandates;
- Better understanding of healthcare spending;
- Flexibility with funding arrangements based on risk tolerance; and
- Opportunity to abide by Hyde Amendment requirements.

CONS OF SELF-INSURED PLANS:

- Potential assumption of greater financial risk;
- Savings are not always immediate;
- Responsibility for all administrative services;
- Management over all aspects of insurance, including denied claims, coverage decisions etc.; and
- May not benefit Centers with high turnover.

Zufall Health Center has been self-insured for two years and has experienced significant savings over that time. Self-insuring may not be right for everyone however, it could be the right choice for you.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

"We are now in 2019 and I continue to chase my own tail!"

After being introduced to Emergency Management in 2008, there were numerous tasks that needed to be completed to ensure our Health Center complied with various federal rules and regulations. At the same time, I also realized FQHCs could benefit from additional funding to support these efforts. We are now in 2019 and I continue to chase my own tail!

In the field of Emergency Management, we need additional funding to prepare for the unexpected and ensure Health Centers can exchange information. Internal training is an activity that we conduct regularly. We train about 50 employees a month. We do the best we can with the very minimal resources we are afforded.

Funding has decreased throughout the years and has truly reached its lowest point to when the five regional coalitions were created. When this occurred, most of the FQHCs felt like they did not receive the necessary aid and support from other healthcare entities, although they still attended coalition meetings.

Some of the equipment we need funding for are N95 masks and generators. The N95 masks are widely used during emergencies and protect people against airborne infectious diseases such as tuberculosis and anthrax. The masks serve as a respirator and ensure safety when the wearer is exposed to hazardous airborne

particulates. Our Health Center used to receive and store them, but we no longer have the funding to do so. The Health Centers would also benefit from funding for generators to keep buildings open during a disaster.

For those who have been part of this battle for years, we will continue to train and coach our employees to respond to any emergency. Once the new regional coalition meetings are established, the FQHCs will have an opportunity to share their ideas; network with neighboring agencies in the region; join forces to promote emergency preparedness; and foster a multiagency response to unforeseen emergencies. We have been told there may be more funding up the pike too.

QUALITY ASSURANCE/ QUALITY IMPROVEMENT

Building the Infrastructure for a Value Driven Approach

Quality, value-based care is one of the priorities of HRSA's Bureau of Primary Health Care. Although the approach of value-driven healthcare can be the daunting, **FQHCs** across the state can strategize create to sustainable landscape that is outcomes based. In order to better respond to an outcome driven model. we need to advocate for

reimbursement models that compensate Health Centers for addressing social determinants of health, behavioral health, telehealth, home visits, and transportation.

Collectively, we need to build the infrastructure to better capture and access data in order to measure the effectiveness of provider interventions.

Therefore, we must have a population level system to continually improve patient outcomes,

while saving our bottom line. My suggestion is to launch statewide Quality Improvement efforts such as real-time access to data via Health Exchange and Information Oral Integration. In addition, we should exchange data on various initiatives including Million Hearts 2022 to reduce heart disease, stroke and other cardiovascular diseases, 80% in Everv Community Colorectal Cancer screening. and Substance Use Disorder Services.

To achieve this goal, the Quality Assurance/ Quality Improvement Peer Group should establish annual goals to sustain quality in the state and assist in facilitating the improvement process.

FQHCs Serving Special Populations: A Call to Reconvene

The Value of Using Population Health Management Tools

Population Health Management (PHM) is the aggregation of patient data across multiple

health information technology resources and the analysis of that data into a single, actionable patient record. PHM also allows providers to improve both clinical and financial outcomes. This information is gathered through the utilization of health information technology.

The population health tools providers utilize are important because they ensure health improvements are identified and measured at a touch of a button.

ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF A PHM TOOL:

- Robust care management that improves the patients' ability to self-manage their care;
- Real-time data collection that includes social determinants and claims data integration to identify gaps in care;
- Risk stratification to understand health care needs and trends;
- Predictive analytics to inform decisions;
- · Personalized care for each patient; and
- The creation of a complete, comprehensive patient population profile to assist with identifying patients at risk for hospital readmission and create patient-specific care plans.

At CompleteCare, our mission is to improve lives by providing convenient, comprehensive, highquality healthcare to every person in every community that we serve.

PHM helps achieve positive health outcomes by:

- Preventing and managing chronic and infectious disease:
- Identifying gaps in care;
